About the UTA Percussion Studio

The UTA Percussion Studio, under the direction of Dr. Andrew Eldridge, is committed to teaching students the skills necessary to cultivate a career in the arts. The UTA Percussion Ensemble was selected as a winner of the prestigious Percussive Arts Society International Percussion Ensemble Competition in 2024 and will present a Showcase Concert at the PAS International Convention. The UTA Percussion Ensemble also presented Showcase Concerts at the 2017 and 2023 Texas Music Educators Association Convention. Through a well-rounded percussion curriculum, students are given multiple opportunities to hone their skills in a variety of performing ensembles and a directed applied lesson structure. The studio size is kept between 25-30 students to maximize the teacher/student ratio. Students of the UTA Percussion Studio enjoy a multi-faceted approach to learning a broad spectrum of musical idioms, with many participating in DCI and WGI ensembles as well as seminars and competitions across the country. UTA offers both undergraduate and graduate degrees in percussion.
