Dr. Douglas Stotter

Dr. Douglas Stotter was Director of Bands, Professor of Music, and Coordinator of the Wind/Percussion Area for the UTA Music Department. He conducted the Wind Symphony and taught undergraduate and graduate conducting as well as wind literature courses while overseeing all aspects of the band program. He was active as conductor, clinician, and adjudicator throughout the United States and abroad. Prior to his appointment at UTA, Dr. Stotter served as Assistant Director of Bands at Indiana University and Director of Bands/head of instrumental music education at Valdosta State University. Dr. Stotter's textbook, *Methods and Materials for Conducting*, was published in 2006 by GIA Publications and is now in use at numerous universities across the country. Dr. Stotter's arrangements for concert band are published by Daehn Music.

Dr. Stotter received Bachelor's and Master's degrees in music education from The University of Michigan and the Doctor of Musical Arts degree in conducting from The University of Iowa. He was a member of the Conductors Guild, the Music Educators National Conference, the National Band Association, the Texas Bandmasters Association, and the Texas Music Educators Association. Dr. Stotter was an active member of the College Band Directors National Association, where he served on the National Executive Board as treasurer and President of the Southwest Division. Dr. Stotter was an honorary member of Kappa Kappa Psi and Tau Beta Sigma chapters at Indiana University, the University of Missouri-Rolla, Valdosta State University, and the University of Michigan.
