Description of Course Content

This course presents personality psychology, including but not limited to, six theoretical approaches to personality. In addition, it emphasizes current research of models, assessments, and applications of personality theories.

Student Learning Outcomes

- 1. Students will master the six theoretical approaches to personality.
- 2. Students will be able to apply the six theoretical personality approaches to their lives.

- 3. Students will understand assessments and models of the six theoretical approaches.
- 4. Students will comprehend personality research methods, techniques, inventories, and procedures.
- 5. Students will recognize relevant research of all six theories.
- 6. Students will be familiar with the interactions of personality, culture, gender, feminism, and mental illness as well as relevant cognitive, emotional and social issues.

Descriptions of major assignments and examinations Quiz (30 pts.)

Students will complete one quiz consisting of 30 multiple-choice questions worth 30 points. To take the quiz, students will use Respondus Lockdown Browser and Respondus Lockdown Webcam (see Respondus details below). On quiz day students have 60 minutes to complete the quiz opening at 12:01 a.m. and will complete it before 11:59 p.m. that same day. Anyone not completing the quiz during this time frame will earn a zero. **The quiz may not be made up regardless of the reason**.

Exams (100 pts. each)

Students will complete four (4) examinations, each consisting of 35 multiple-choice questions. Every exam is worth 100 points, totaling 400 points. <u>I DO NOT DROP ANY EXAM GRADES</u>, <u>and I do not offer second attempts.</u> Therefore, study, study, study. On exam day students will have 70 minutes to complete the exams before midnight. To take the exams, students will use Respondus Lockdown Browser and Respondus Lockdown Webcam (see details below).

Approval for make-up exams **must be approved by me** due to emergency circumstances only. **If** there is an emergency with **approved documentation** (doctor's note), students must email me **official documentation within three (3) days** from the date the exam was administered. I will then decide on whether the absence is approved or not. Anyone <u>not</u> making up an exam within **five (5) days** of the exam date will earn a zero on that exam. Also, students who do not have my approved absence will earn a zero on that test.

Technology Requirements

Canvas

All lessons, exams, announcements, grades, and supplemental materials are posted in Canvas at <u>https://uta.instructure.com</u>. I encourage students to read the required textbook chapters each week <u>before</u> watching my weekly video(s) teaching the chapter. Respondus Lockdown Browser (LDB)

Respondus Lockdown Browser is an online proctoring service that all students must download to their computer, laptop, or iPad and use for all examinations and quiz. Just before the quiz in Week 3, students will download this browser. **Students will not be able to access an examination or quiz** without this browser. NOTE: Respondus Lockdown Browser does not work on mobile devices.

Required Webcam

A webcam is required for all examinations and quiz. Before class begins, students will secure a webcam to complete all four exams and quiz. Students will not be able to access the quiz or examinations without this webcam. NOTE: A cell phone camera is not sufficient; the webcam must be connected to a laptop.

Grading Information – Quiz & Examinations

Quiz (30 pts.)

Students will complete one quiz containing 30 multiple-choice questions worth 30 points. Quiz content includes weekly videos, our 9th edition textbook, and other noted materials under "Announcements" in Canvas. The time frame is 45 minutes. **This quiz may not be made up regardless of the reason**; therefore, anyone missing the quiz will earn a zero – <u>NO exceptions</u>.

Examinations (100 pts. each)

Students will complete online three (3) examinations and a non-comprehensive final examination. Each exam consists of 35 multiple-choice questions totaling 100 points per exam. The exam content covers videos, our 9th edition textbook, and other supplemental materials noted in Canvas under

"Announcements." The time for each exam is 70 minutes. I expect students to study for each exam to finish in the time allotted.

Also, students will <u>NOT</u> use any textbook, the Internet, cell phone, notes, additional computers, laptops, iPads, other technology, help from any person in or out of class, or <u>any other type of</u> <u>assistance</u> before or during a quiz or exam. Doing so is cheating, and the consequence is a zero on the quiz or exam.

Furthermore, students are <u>NOT</u> permitted to discuss quiz or exam content, questions, answers, or other details with anyone else, including individuals not in this class. Doing so is cheating and the consequence is a zero. Students may not ask other students whether the quiz or exam covers the material on the study guides, and students may not share any information about the quiz or exam with anyone, including whether the quiz or exam covers the study guide material. Doing so is cheating, resulting in a zero on that quiz or exam. To reiterate, students are not permitted to receive any assistance before or during a quiz or exam. Doing so is cheating, in a zero on that quiz or exam.

Once grades are posted in Canvas, students have **three (3) days to dispute their grade** from the date of posting. Once three (3) days have passed after posting, students cannot dispute their grades. This rule is to eliminate anyone asking for extra points to be added to her or his grade near the end of the semester.

Make-up Exams – No make-up on quiz – no exception

If a student has an emergency and misses an exam, s/he is required to ask for my approval after proving me with official documentation (e.g., doctor's note) within three (3) days of the exam date.

Furthermore, anyone approved to take a make-up exam must complete it **within five (5) days** of the exam date; otherwise, s/he will earn a zero on that exam. Students making up an exam are **<u>not</u>** permitted to discuss the exam with anyone, including individuals <u>not</u> in this class, and **must abide** by the above instructions under the heading, "Grading."

Academic dishonesty and cheating are not tolerated and will earn a grade of zero.

Expectations for Out-of-Class Study

For every credit hour, I expect students to spend three (3) hours or more working out of class. Specifically, for this three-credit hour class, students are to spend at least nine (9) hours weekly reading, studying, and reviewing my weekly videos, other videos or materials posted in Canvas, our 9th edition textbook, and information in my announcements as well as completing exams or the quiz.

Grading Policy

Course grades will be computed as follows: A = 90% or above; B = 80-89%; C = 70-79%; D=60-69%, F = below 60%. To compute a grade, divide the total number of points offered thus far by the total number of points earned. The result is a decimal which can be converted to a percentage.

Because students earn their grades, **I do not bump any grades or add free points**. If the final grade consists of a half point, I round up only if the half point is 0.5 or above. Students who study diligently throughout the semester earn their grades. It is not fair for me to add free points to other students who have not worked as hard as they have. Therefore, do not ask me to bump a grade because your request will fall on deaf ears. I also do not offer extra credit because this course provides ample opportunities to earn a good grade.
