Time and Place of Class Meetings

This course will take place online only. While much of the course will be completed asynchronously, there may be opportunities for synchronous sessions. Any live sessions will be recorded, and I will be available to answer any questions that you might have.

Description of Course Content

This course explores ethical considerations for the collection and use of learning data, including social and trust practices with learners, access, ownership, storage, security, privacy, policy, transparency, and algorithms.

Student Learning Outcomes

By the end of the course, students will be able to:

- Identify fundamental privacy and ethics principles for the field of learning analytics
- Consider ethics principles in their context and application in learning analytics
- Describe social and trust practices in learning analytics
- Evaluate different learning analytics frameworks
- Explain fundamental data practices including governance (such as stewardship, ownership, access, security, transparency) for learning analytics

Required Textbooks and Other Course Materials

There are no required texts to purchase for this course. Any course materials are either publicly available or can be accessed through the UTA Library.

Descriptions of Course Assignments

Reflections 20%

After completing course themes, you will have the opportunity to reflect on prompts through the discussion forums. Responses should be thoughtful and thorough enough to address the prompt.

Discussions 20%

You will have the opportunity to converse over specific topics in the discussion forums each week. Responses should be thoughtful and thorough enough to address the prompt.

Annotated Bibliography 20%

After completing a course theme, you will search for and identify an academic source related to one of the theme's topics to create an annotated bibliography. There will be three total sources. You will include the title, citation, brief summary, and evaluation for each source.

Presentation 20%

You will prepare and present on an ethics topic. The presentation will last approximately fifteen minutes.

Final Paper 20%

After completing all course materials, you will reflect and develop a comprehensive preliminary learning analytics initiative plan related to your context. 40% of the assignment grade will be consideration of the elements of all course themes/topics related to privacy/ethics.

Technology Requirements

This course will primarily take place in Canvas, with some synchronous times and office hours in Zoom or MS Teams.

Other Requirements

You will also be invited to attend online events during the duration of the course (and the program in general). These events may require additional technologies not detailed above.
