Description of Course Content

- This course introduces students to phenomena, principles, and theories in psychology.
- Psy is the scientific study of living organisms (often focusing on humans).
- Psy considers mind, attitudes, and behaviors of groups and of individuals
- Psychologists use empirical research and various methods to investigate and analyze mental processes and behavioral patterns.

Student Learning Outcomes

After completing this course, students should be able to:

- · Be familiar with key psychological theories
- Understand the basic principles of psychological research
- · Be aware of the various sub-disciplines in psychology
- Have a basic understanding when reading and evaluating psychology articles
- Employ psychology to understand, predict, and improve outcomes in a real-world situation.

This course is designed to interest and meet the needs of both psychology majors and non-majors. This course satisfies the University of Texas at Arlington core curriculum requirement in social and behavioral sciences. As such, it contains core objectives in critical thinking, communication, empirical and quantitative reasoning, and social responsibility.

- Critical Thinking Skills include creative thinking, innovation, inquiry, and analysis, evaluation
 and synthesis of information.
- Communication Skills include effective development, interpretation and expression of ideas through written, oral and visual communication.
- Empirical and Quantitative Skills include the manipulation and analysis of numerical data or observable facts resulting in informed conclusions.

• Social Responsibility includes intercultural competence, knowledge of civic responsibility, and the ability to engage effectively in regional, national, and global communities.

These \(\frac{1}{2} \) will be assessed as items in an end of year quiz that will be posted on Canvas. As with the Research Participation Requirement, completion of this assessment is required.

Descriptions of major assignments and examinations

- Final Exam: Cumulative 100 multiple choice questions 150 minutes in-person
- Unit Exams: 3 online Exams (50 multiple choice questions) Each exam is worth 50 points. All exams will be cumulative (meaning that questions may include content from previous units). These will be done online asynchronous. You may take them in your own time between the Thursday mentioned in the schedule and the nearest Sunday. You will have a limit of 50 minutes upon starting the test. Connect Plus will automatically submit your exam if you fail to finish the exam so make sure you have enough time to complete the exam and that you will not have technical issues that interfere.
- SmartBook: An interactive text designed to help you review the material learned in each chapter. The SmartBook system continually adjusts to your level of content mastery. A link to each SmartBook assignment can be found on Canvas. Each chapter on average will take at least 1.5 hours to complete, therefore you should not expect to complete these in a single run (spread out the work!). Answering incorrectly will mean that a student will need to spend more time in the assignment. Each SmartBook module will be worth 25 points. All chapters of each unit are due on the same day, which does not mean that you should do them at the last minute. It would be more convenient for you to complete the readings at the same pace, as the class schedule.
- Core Curriculum Quiz: 180 minutes to complete 43 institution-selected questions.
- Semester Project: Throughout the semester, you will be learning about the people and societies that surround you. This semester-long project offers you the opportunity to put into practice the concepts covered in the classroom, applying them to real-life situations. As you engage with psychological phenomena during your lessons, your task is to observe and identify instances of these phenomena in the world around you. Your assignment involves maintaining a journal where you document specific scenarios that illustrate the psychological phenomena discussed in class. For each scene you describe, explain how it aligns with a phenomenon you studied in class.
- Research Participation Requirement: The Psychology Department requires that all students taking Introduction to Psychology complete a 6-credit research requirement. You will be able to

complete this requirement by participating in on site or online research conducted by department faculty and their research assistants. As an alternative to participating in research, you may choose to write reviews of approved research articles. Completing this assignment will be done via **Sona** (http://uta.sona-systems.com/). A departmental handout detailing this requirement and important deadlines can be found at www.uta.edu/psychology at the research participation information link. Questions pertaining to this assignment can be sent to psycpool@uta.edu. Points are not added to the course grade for completion of the research participation requirement.

FAILURE TO COMPLETE THE REQUIREMENT WILL RESULT IN AN INCOMPLETE FOR THE CLASS. You will then need to complete your requirement (all 6 hours, regardless of what you may have completed this semester) during the next semester or the Incomplete will turn into an "F."

Attendance
