Description of Course Content

The fundamental methods and content of scientific psychology. Concentration on the understanding of basic principles.

Student Learning Outcomes

After completing this course, students should be able to:

- Be familiar with key psychological theories
- Understand the basic principles of psychological research
- Be aware of the various sub-disciplines in psychology
- Have a basic understanding when reading and evaluating psychology articles
- Understand how psychology can be applied to our everyday lives

In addition, as this course satisfies the University of Texas at Arlington core curriculum requirement in social and behavioural sciences, it contains core objectives and learning outcomes in the following:

- **Critical Thinking Skills** include creative thinking, innovation, inquiry, and analysis, evaluation and synthesis of information.
- **Communication Skills** include effective development, interpretation and expression of ideas through written, oral and visual communication.
- **Empirical and Quantitative Skills** include the manipulation and analysis of numerical data or observable facts resulting in informed conclusions.

• **Social Responsibility** includes intercultural competence, knowledge of civic responsibility, and the ability to engage effectively in regional, national, and global communities.

Descriptions of major assignments and examinations

SmartBook 2.0 Assignments: 30% of Final Grade

SmartBook is an interactive text designed to help you review the material learned in each chapter. The SmartBook system continually adjusts to your level of content mastery. A link to each SmartBook assignment can be found on Canvas.

Each chapter on average will take approximately 45 to 60 minutes to complete. Scores are assigned based on the percentage of mastery for each assignment. There will be 17 SmartBook assignments, each assignment will be worth **15 points**. Only scores for your top 10 SmartBook assignments will count towards your final grade to total 150 points, the lowest seven scores will be dropped from your final grade.

Exams: 40% of Final Grade

There are four 50-question Unit Exams and a Comprehensive 100-question Final Exam (which will include all chapters covered in class). Each exam is worth 50 points, including the final. If a student is satisfied with their grade after completing the fourth exam, they can choose to not take the Final Exam. Alternatively, the student can decide to take the Final Exam to try for a higher grade. The lowest exam grade will be dropped at the end of the course.

There are no make-up exams. If you miss an exam, regardless of the reason (illness, schedule conflict, etc.), you will need to plan to take the Comprehensive Final Exam to make up the grade on the missed exam. Mark Exam Days in your calendar now to keep you prepared in advance for these possibilities. If we have to reschedule an exam for whatever reason (weather, illness, behind on course material), I will allow for more days to complete it.

Rules for Exam Days:

- Exams will be taken from home or in a quiet and secluded area on campus. This is an open book exam; You will be expected to use your personal notes.
- Lockdown Browser will be required
- Once the exam begins, you may not leave your seat at any point. If that occurs due to unforeseen circumstances, please send me an email detailing what happened
- The exam cannot be re-scheduled. Be sure to begin the exam at (time due duration of the exam) at the latest. This means that if the exam is due at 13:00 and it is 90 minutes long, you would need to begin no later than 11:30.

Attendance: 20% of Final Grade

Regular attendance and participation will count towards your final grade. Students are expected to come to class having read the book chapter being taught on a specific day (check course schedule) and participate in in-class discussions held regarding that chapter. This is a fairly straightforward and easy path to earning points and hence you are strongly recommended to take advantage of it.

Quizzes: 10% of Final Grade

There will be 5 in class quizzes. The last quiz for the course will be the core curriculum quiz. All PSYC 1315 students must complete the Core Curriculum Quiz by the end of the semester

Research Participation Requirement

The Psychology Department requires that all students taking Introduction to Psychology complete a 6-credit research requirement. You will be able to complete this requirement by participating in on site or online research conducted by department faculty and their research assistants. . A typical 30-minute experiment is worth 0.5-credit. Hence, if you participate in two 30-minute studies or one 60-minute study, you will be awarded 1 of the 6 credits required.

As an alternative to participating in research, you may choose to write reviews of approved research articles. Completing this assignment will be done via **Sona** (http://uta.sona-systems.com/). You may also choose to attend departmental colloquia or complete article quizzes. A handout detailing this requirement and important deadlines will be provided. Questions pertaining to this assignment can be sent to psycpool@uta.edu. Points are not added to the course grade for completion of the research participation requirement.

FAILURE TO COMPLETE THE REQUIREMENT WILL RESULT IN AN INCOMPLETE FOR THE CLASS. You will then need to complete your requirement (all 6 hours, regardless of what you may have completed this semester) during the next semester or the Incomplete will turn into an "F."

Technology Requirements

Students will use Connect for the SmartBook 2.0 assignments. Students will also access Canvas to keep track of course progress and stay informed regarding news and events taking place in class. You will need a webcam for the exams (do not worry about an external webcam if you have one built-in).

Face Covering Policy

Face coverings are not mandatory; all students and instructional staff are welcome to wear face coverings while they are on campus or in the classroom.

Attendance

Attending class sessions is a critical predictor and indicator of student success. The University of Texas at Arlington does not recognize a single attendance policy but encourages faculty—to establish class-specific policies on attendance. As the instructor of this section, I will take attendance on 5 random days.

The U.S. Department of Education requires that UT Arlington have a mechanism in place to verify Federal Student Aid recipients' attendance in courses. UT Arlington instructors are expected to report the last date of attendance when submitting students' final course grades; specifically, when a student earns a course grade of F, instructors must report the last date a student attended their class. For on-campus classes, last date of attendance can be based on attendance rosters or on academic engagements—a test, participation in a class project or presentation, or Canvas-based activity. Online or distance education courses require regular and substantive online interaction and participation. Students must participate in online course activities in Canvas to demonstrate attendance; logging into an online class is not sufficient by itself to demonstrate attendance. The last date of attendance is reported to the U.S. Department of Education for federal financial aid recipients.

Emergency Exit Procedures
