

Priyanjali Chakraborty (She/Her/Hers) earned a BA degree in Political Science from St. Xavier's College, Kolkata, India and a MA in Women's Studies from the Tata Institute of Social Sciences in Hyderabad, India. She also holds a Human Rights Duties and Education diploma from St. Xavier's College, Kolkata.

Her research uses a mixed-methods approach and is focused on unmet familyplanning needs of low-income and immigrant populations in the United States, examining the role of health literacy interventions in healthcare access. This

research is informed by her academic background and field experiences in community-based programs for women's reproductive and maternal health, and their economic empowerment in her roles with the National Rural Livelihoods Mission in Rajasthan as a Corporate Social Responsibility Manager. Her experience with grassroots NGOs in India, addressing mental health, disaster relief, and educational needs for all ages, has fortified her commitment to researching health disparities among vulnerable populations.

Through her work on federally funded research projects, she has furthered her training and expertise in policy data collection, secondary data analysis, survey research, and qualitative methods. She has co-authored seven peer-reviewed publications and presented at the Society for Social Work and Research, the Southwestern Social Science Association, and the American Public Health Association Conferences.

She also serves as a student member of the SSWR Doctoral Student Committee and the South Asian Social Work Educators Association and has served as a Treasurer for the School of Social Work's Doctoral Student's Association. She is committed to the cause of women's health and economic empowerment and is enthusiastic about helping social work students build a composite of awareness, values, knowledge, and skills needed to conduct practice with and research on social justice issues that transcend geographies.

Her research interests include treatment retention issues in psychiatric settings, social determinants of health and mental health, community-engaged research, cultural disparities and their influence on substance abuse and addiction, and cross-cultural factors among ethnic minority groups, as well as international social work. She has a special interest in community-engaged research aimed at improving mental health outcomes for underserved populations. To advance this interest, she has actively engaged in Community-Based Participatory Research (CBPR) and experiential learning studies.

Her primary research focus is on understanding the factors that contribute to treatment dropout in behavioral health settings and identifying both risk and protective factors that affect treatment retention among people of color. She hopes that her research will guide the implementation of evidence-based interventions and policies, so that mental health services can become more equitable, accessible, and effective for all individuals, regardless of their background or ethnicity.

Megan R. Westmore, LMSW (she/her), received her Master of Science in Social Work degree with a concentration in Community and Administrative Leadership from the University of Texas at Austin in 2014. She additionally holds a BSW and a bachelor's degree in Spanish from UT Austin. She is a PhD candidate in her final year at the University of Texas at Arlington School of Social Work and has received the prestigious Norman Pauling Fellowship from the University of Texas system in recognition of outstanding accomplishments during her graduate studies.

After completing her MSSW, Megan spent seven years in social work practice focusing on two primary areas: policy advocacy for people with intellectual and/or developmental disabilities (IDD), and prevention and healing services related to sexual violence. During this time, she developed an interest in primary prevention of violence against individuals with disabilities and co-authored a healthy relationship and safer sexuality curriculum for young adults with IDD entitled My Rights My Life, published in 2022.

Megan plans to continue this work through researching access to intimate partner and sexual violence prevention and healing services for individuals with IDD, and how such access impacts victimization. She is particularly interested in violence primary prevention programs such as healthy relationship and safer sexuality education. She utilizes mixed methods and social network analysis in her research, which allows her to answer important questions about victimization rates and prevention intervention effectiveness while also centering the voices of individuals with disabilities themselves. In addition, Megan seeks to train the next generation of social work practitioners in taking an intersectional approach to services that recognizes the strengths and needs of clients. She is passionate about incorporating open pedagogical practices into her classroom and has experience teaching both in-person and virtually.
