

Restricting Access to Abortions - Acceptable or Regrettable?

As most, if not all, of us are aware, the landmark legislation of Roe v. Wade was overturned by the U.S. Supreme Court almost a year ago on June 24, 2022. Currently, we are seeing an attack on the abortion drug, mifepristone, which was approved by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) in 2000. U.S. District Court Judge Matthew Kacsmaryk ruled that access to this drug ought to be restricted, negating the judgment of the FDA. Due to Justice Samuel Alito extending a hold on this ruling, we will not know the Supreme Courts' decision on this matter until after Wednesday, April 19th. Regardless of anyones' reason behind choosing to use mifepristone, as future social workers, there are a few important questions we ought to consider. Is it ethical for a panel of nine justices to determine the accessibility of an FDA-approved drug? Does restriction to abortion access fall in line with the values and ethical principles outlined by the NASW Code of Ethics? Does the limitation to abortion access promote the dignity and self-determination of the individual?

If this is a matter which you feel passionate about, and you wish to learn more about the power of the Supreme Court along with ways you can advocate for the causes you care about in conjunction with the cases they are currently considering, then you may wish to read a few articles provided by the League of Women Voters.

I implore you to determine how you feel about this case, consider your thoughts on future cases which are set to be discussed, and utilize your advocacy skills learned throughout this program!
